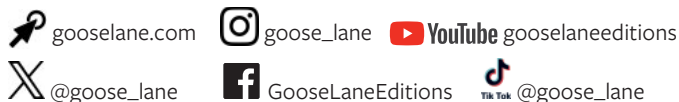

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The Big 7-0

Goose Lane Editions owes its existence to three poets, writers, and publishers: Fred Cogswell, Peter Thomas, and Douglas Lochhead. We like to view them as “the stubborn strong” (in homage to Fred Cogswell’s first poetry collection *The Stunted Strong*), as multi-dimensional individuals whose lifework led them to academia, to writing and editing, and to printing and publishing. They were friends and mentors to a generation of writers.

Collectively, they were part of a social movement that expanded the territory of Canadian publishing beyond avant-garde literature to include books that addressed alternative points of view. Brought about by the expansion of universities and colleges, the political activism of the 1960s, and the development of more economical printing technology, this new publishing movement attracted a cohort of readers who were excited to read fresh perspectives about their own part of the world.

Today, the company they founded and led is still standing. It’s now firmly established as Goose Lane Editions. This year, the year in which we celebrate seventy years of publishing, readers will have the opportunity to discover one of the most ambitious publishing lists of our existence. Here you’ll find works of fiction that travel through time and geography; inspiring biographies and memoirs that address difficult moments of the past, which continue to reverberate in the present; works of travel literature and cultural history that may enlarge your world; and volumes of essays and trail guides that will immerse readers in the beauty and challenges of nature and the environment.

But don’t stop there. Keep going and you’ll find books on the iconic artists of the 20th century and the trailblazers of the 21st, including those exhibiting at this year’s Toronto Biennial of Art. Born to Walk

My Journey of Trials and Resilience

ALPHA NKURANGA

- Nkuranga became a refugee during the Rwandan civil war.
- Draws attention to problems of gender-based violence and inadequate access to education for women in East Africa.
- Nkuranga was the first woman in her family to graduate high school.

“My grandparents used to tell me Rwanda is a country unlike any other, and I knew they spoke the truth. Blessed with majestic mountains and breathtaking valleys, it is a sacred and spiritual land. And yet Rwandan men drenched the land in blood in acts of hate so horrific that the stains of those three years will not fade in one hundred lifetimes.”

At the age of eight, Alpha Nkuranga made a fateful decision. With war raging around her, she grabbed the hand of her younger brother, Elijah, and ran from her grandparents’ home. When they came to a swamp, they hid until it was safe to escape. Weeks later, they joined a group of refugees, who were fleeing to Tanzania. “If I kept walking,” Alpha remembers thinking, “I could tell my story.”

Nkuranga emigrated to Canada more than a decade later. She now works with women and children who face abuse and homelessness. In *Born to Walk*, she tells a remarkable story of resistance and survival.

ALPHA NKURANGA fled her village during the Rwandan civil war of 1994 and subsequently lived in refugee camps in Tanzania and Uganda. She came to Canada as a refugee in 2010 and currently lives in Kitchener, Ontario, where she works for Women’s Crisis Services of Waterloo Region.

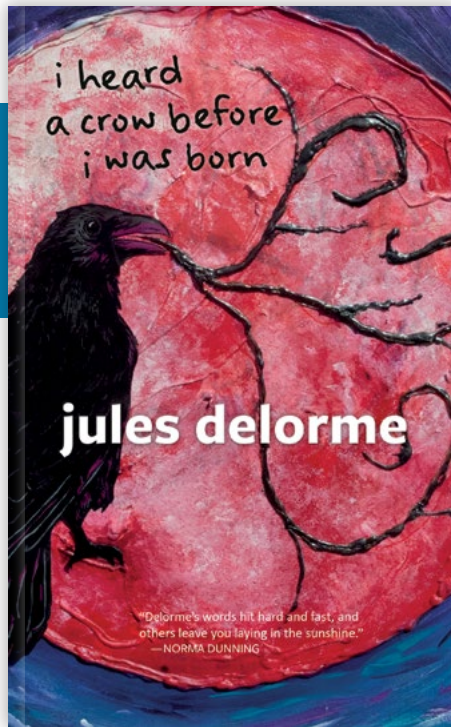

JULES DELORME

- Delorme grew up on Akwesasne Reserve, on the St. Lawrence River.
- Delorme refers to himself as an “old, young writer,” having published his first book, *faller*, in 2022, when he was 61 years old.
- Before entering the publishing world, Delorme was an actor and scriptwriter. He wrote the 1997 sci-fi film *Future Fear*.

i heard a crow before i was born opens with a dream-memory that transforms into a stark, poetic reflection on the generational trauma faced by many Indigenous families. Jules Delorme was born to resentful and abusive parents, in a world in which he never felt he belonged. Yet, buoyed by the love shown to him by his *tóta* (grandmother) and his many animal protectors, Delorme gained the strength to reckon with his brutal childhood and create this transformative and evocative memoir.

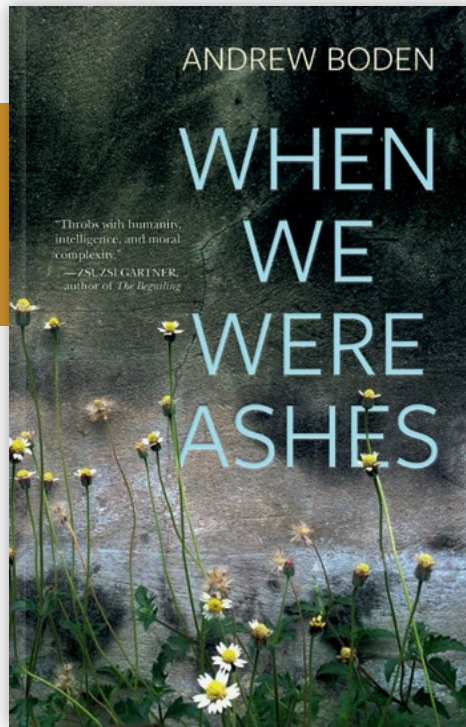
Across chapters that tell of his troubled relationships, Delorme unwraps the pain at the centre of his own story: the residential schools and the aftershocks that continue to reverberate.

In this stunning testament to the power of storytelling — to help us grieve and help us survive — Delorme tells the story of his spirit walk as he embraces the contradictions of his identity. As he writes, “*i heard a crow before i was born* is a man looking back, and dreaming back, and seeing that life, in whatever form it takes, however harsh it might seem, is beautiful.”

JULES DELORME is a neurodivergent Mohawk author of Mohawk and French heritage. When Delorme was 12, his abusive parents moved the family to Toronto, where he continued to suffer bullying and abuse at home and at school. He is also the author of *faller* and *AHSHIÁ:TON (You Should Write It)*, a collection of stories based on Mohawk oral traditions and teachings. *i heard a crow before i was born* is Delorme’s third book. He lives in Toronto.

ANDREW BODEN

When the grey bus came to take Rainor Schacht and his friends in the ward for disabled children to a remote hospital called Trutzburg, they had no idea what dark reality awaited them.

No one would tell them what to expect — not Nurse Hilde; not Peter Berger, the kind bus driver; not Dr. Lutz, who ran the Nazi hospital with ruthless efficiency.

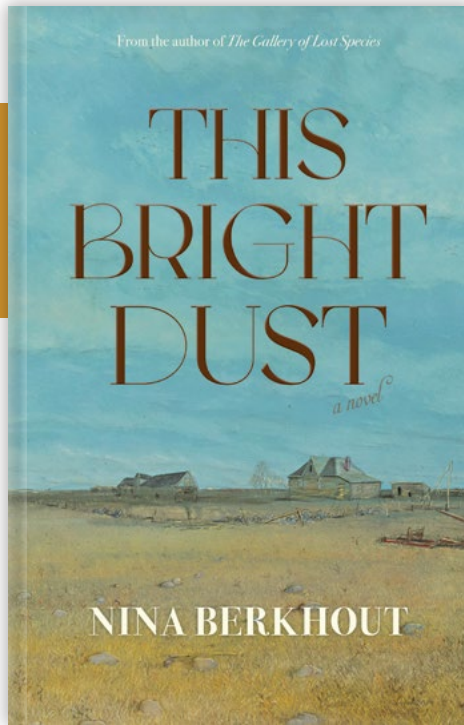
Years later, with Berger’s coded diary in hand, Rainor sets out to find Emmi, a fellow survivor of Trutzburg, who looked past Rainor’s disfigurement and elicited the magic that gave purpose to Rainor and solace to Emmi and the other children.

Set against the backdrop of the Second World War, Andrew Boden’s *When We Were Ashes* takes us to the chilling depths of Aktion T4, one of the darkest chapters in the history of Nazi Germany. In this hauntingly poignant novel, Rainor is led on an illuminating journey to learn the truth about his past and the even more extraordinary truth about his present.

ANDREW BODEN’s fiction and non-fiction have been published in numerous magazines and anthologies in Canada and the US, including the *Journey Prize Anthology*, *Prairie Fire*, the *New Quarterly*, *Intima: A Journal of Narrative Medicine*, and *Descant*. He is the co-editor of *Hidden Lives: Coming Out on Mental Illness*, a ground-breaking anthology of evocative personal essays. He lives in Burnaby, British Columbia.

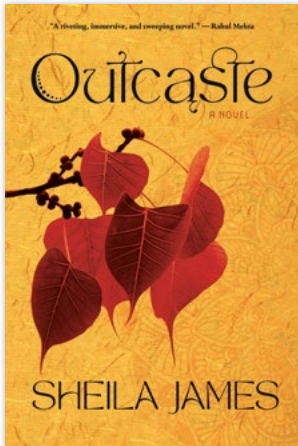
In 1939, as the Great Depression winds down and war in Europe looms, the small Prairie community of Grayley is all but abandoned. Abel Dodds paces his family's plot, searching for gold his late father buried in an undisclosed location. When his neighbour Jake Wishart drops by to tell Abel he's leaving town and to ask if Abel can keep an eye on his sister, Una, and her son and grandfather, Abel reluctantly agrees.

Abel and the Wisharts prepare for the growing season — their last chance to make a living on their debt-burdened farms. When they hear the news of a visit from the king and queen to rally troops, tensions rise. With little food on their tables and a land turned to dust, the unfailingly optimistic Una is convinced that the royal tour will change their lives for the better. But Abel wants a reckoning.

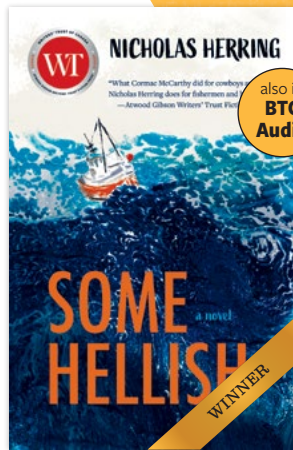

From Birchbark Canoes to Indigenous Rights

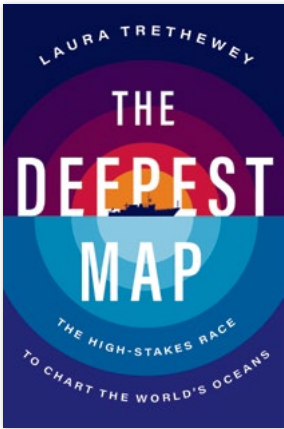
Tappan Adney travelled from New York to New Brunswick for a summer holiday at the age of 19 in 1887, and it changed the course of his life.

Adney is best known for a singular achievement. He was the artist, writer, and illustrator whose chance encounter with Peter Jo, a Wəlastəkwi Elder-craftsman, led to a passionate, lifelong interest in the birchbark canoe and Wəlastəkwey culture.

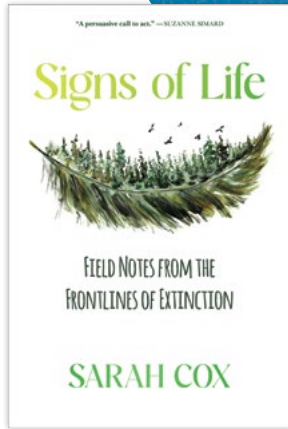
But that is only part of the story. Throughout his life, little escaped Adney's curiosity. From his extensive documentation of the design of Indigenous canoes to his reportage on the Klondike Gold Rush; from his work as an illustrator, photographer, and designer to his natural history journalism; from his activism for Indigenous rights to his documentation of the Wəlastəkwey language, Adney's mind roamed from one passion to another, leaving behind a treasure trove of natural history and ethnographic research. This book tells the intriguing story of his remarkable life and his multifaceted legacy.

C. TED BEHNE's interest in Tappan Adney began when he attended a birchbark canoe-building class. He edited *The Travel Journals of Tappan Adney*. JAMES W. WHEATON's interest in Tappan Adney began with Wheaton's wife, Joan Adney Dragon, the granddaughter of Tappan Adney. His transcription and annotation of the letters and journals of Dr. Charles Brackett was published as *Surgeon on Horseback*.

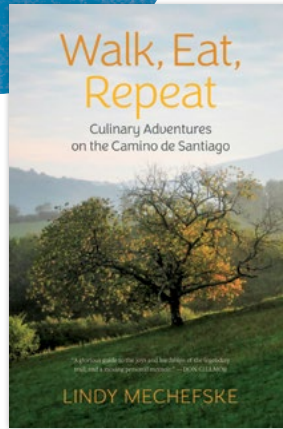

Escaping from the evils of the modern world into the vivid colours of a bird’s plumage, Michael Trussler’s *10:10* plunges into the mystery and horror of living at the beginning of the Anthropocene. How can there be both terrible violence and extraordinary beauty in the world? How can birdwatching coexist with genocide? How can nature be loved and destroyed all at once?

Trussler’s poetic voice is delightfully fluid: moments and images from movies, aesthetic theory, and animal life collide in each poem, sometimes in a single line. From lyrics to prose, high art to emails, Trussler sifts through the shards of society to seek refuge in the beauty and strangeness of words, the beguiling richness of images, the intensity of the natural world.

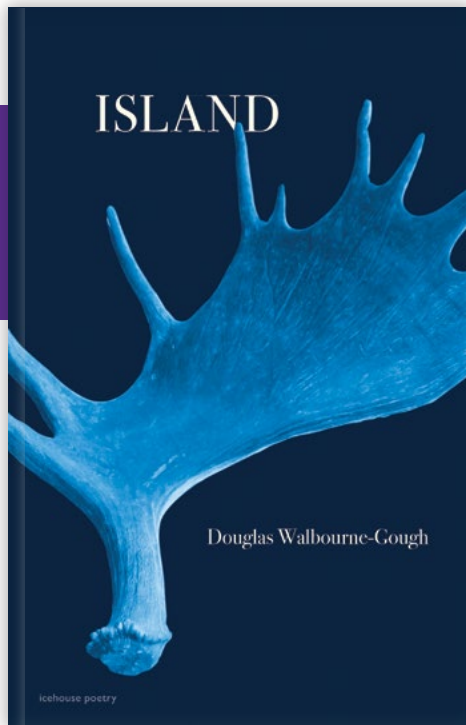

DOUGLAS WALBOURNE-GOUGH

Centred around the Newfoundland Mi’kmaq experience in the wake of the controversial Qalipu First Nation enrolment process, *Island* wades through the fracture and mistrust that continues to linger in many communities. In this new collection, Douglas Walbourne-Gough expands upon issues of identity and history that he introduced in *Crow Gulch*, offering a deeply personal and equally beautiful exploration of Mi’kmaq and Newfoundland identity.

Walbourne-Gough’s narrative poems trace the formation of identity, not through status documentation, but through its deeper roots in childhood memories, family, spirituality, and dreams. Throughout this collection, he approaches life in fragments — snuggling into his nan’s sealskin snowsuit, learning Mi’kmaq from an app, or the myriad of complex emotions that come with receiving a status card — and watches them transform into pieces of an everlasting puzzle. *Island* reckons with an often-ignored, yet persistent, effect of colonialism — fractured identities.

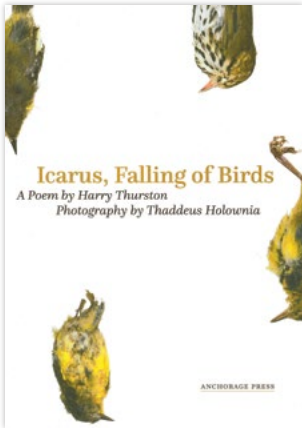
DOUGLAS WALBOURNE-GOUGH is a poet and mixed/adopted status member of the Qalipu Mi’kmaq First Nation from Elmastukwek (the Bay of Islands), Ktaqmkuk (Newfoundland). His debut collection, *Crow Gulch*, won the E.J. Pratt Poetry Award.

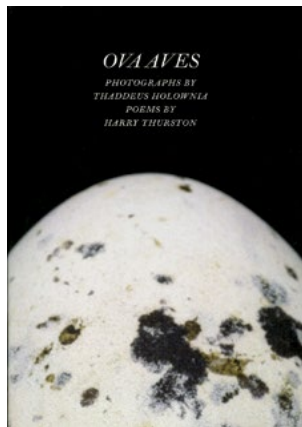

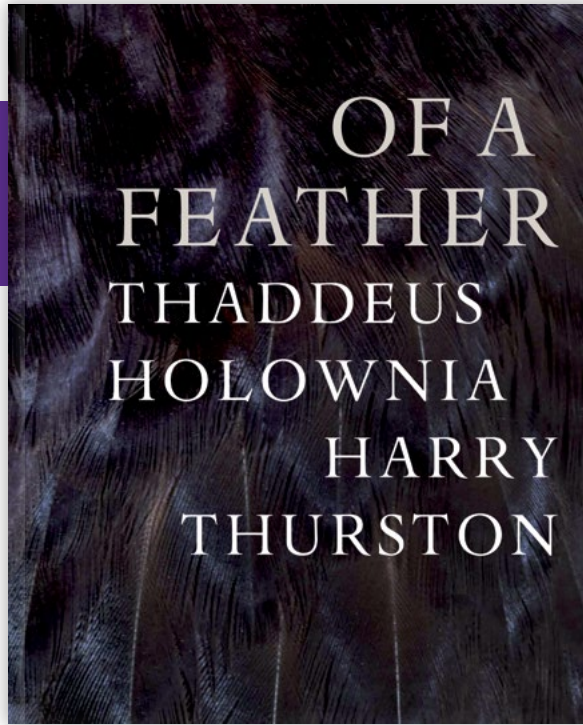

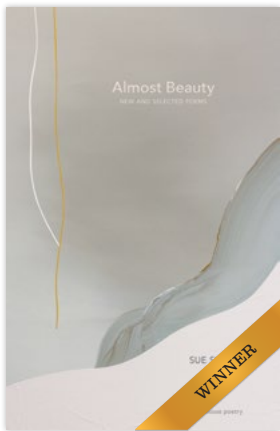

of a feather is the third book in a trilogy that includes *Ova Aves* and *Icarus, Falling of Birds*. Conceived as a tribute to the teacher, naturalist, and ornithologist Gay Hansen — Holownia's late partner and Thurston's long-time friend, the collection combines Thaddeus Holownia's photography of bird feathers with the poetry of Harry Thurston.

Taken individually, the photographs and poems are magnificent in their detail and poise, but together they show how both poetry and science can illuminate the natural world, drawing on the ideas of the likes of Rachel Carson and E.O. Wilson. The result is a wonderful tribute to Hansen and an enduring record of beauty in the natural world.

THADDEUS HOLOWNIA holds the title of research professor in the Pierre Lassonde School of Fine Arts at Mount Allison University. His photographs have been exhibited and collected throughout North America and Europe. HARRY THURSTON is the author of more than two dozen books of poetry and non-fiction. Holownia and Thurston have collaborated on numerous projects including *Silver Ghost*; *Ova Aves*; and *Icarus, Falling of Birds*.

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War among the Clouds

New Brunswick Airmen in the Great War

J. BRENT WILSON

The Great War of 1914–18 was the first conflict in which aircraft played a significant role. It was dangerous and sometimes exciting, and it created and accelerated rapid technological change in the field of aeronautical engineering. The men who served as pilots, observers, gunners, and mechanics signed up for an unknown endeavour and opened up a new chapter in warfare.

War among the Clouds examines the experience of the more than 250 New Brunswickers who served in the British air services during the First World War. While most who saw active service at the front fought in France and Belgium, many served in Italy, Egypt, Macedonia, and Russia. Still others remained behind in Britain or Canada, training new recruits.

Drawing on diaries and letters of airmen, newspaper reports, and archival images and documents, J. Brent Wilson tells the story of a group of men who were forerunners in their field and laid the foundation for the RCAF.

J. BRENT WILSON is the former director of the New Brunswick Military Heritage Project and editor of the New Brunswick Military Heritage Book Series. His publications on military history include *Hurricane Pilot: The Wartime Letters of W.O. Harry L. Gill, DFM, 1940–1943* and *A Family of Brothers: Soldiers of the 26th New Brunswick Battalion in the Great War*.

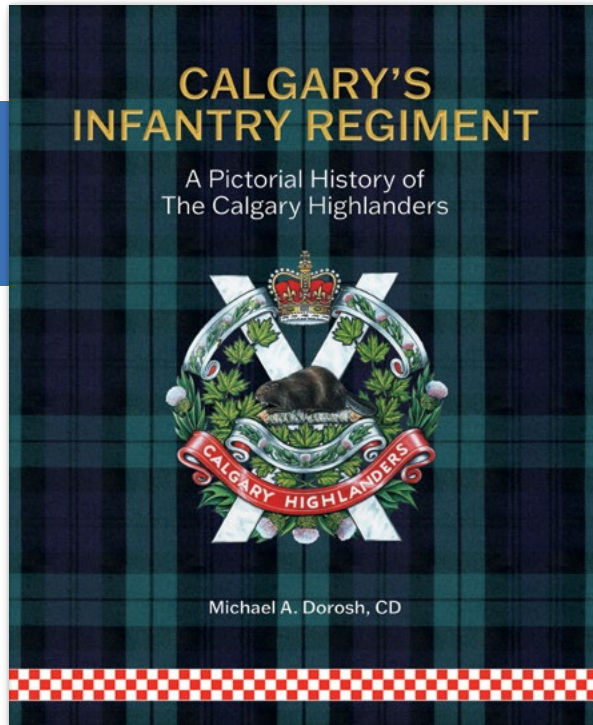

Calgary's Infantry Regiment is a comprehensive history of the Calgary Highlanders on the occasion of the regiment's 100 years of service under that name. This richly illustrated volume surveys the regiment's history dating back to the creation of the 103rd Regiment, Calgary Rifles in 1910 and includes glimpses of Calgary's infantry units in the First World War (including the 10th, 56th and 82nd Battalions); the creation of Calgary's own kilted regiment in 1924; and the service of the Calgary Highlanders in the Second World War, peacekeeping and NATO missions around the world, and the war in Afghanistan.

Michael Dorosh provides a unique study of the regiment's culture — combining text, photos, maps, original works of art, song lyrics and poetry. He highlights the regiment's reputation for valour and endurance, as well as the exceptional service in wartime for which the Highlanders have been rewarded with the honorary distinction of the oak leaf shoulder badge and the Canadian Forces Unit Commendation.

MICHAEL A. DOROSH, CD is the author of several books on Canadian military history, including *The Hard Luck Division: A History of the 2nd Canadian Division in the Second World War*. He has served for thirty-six years with the Calgary Highlanders.

AT ONCE | À LA FOIS

- Accompanies a touring solo exhibition of Yu's work at the Art Gallery of Ontario and the Guido Molinari Foundation.

JINNY YU: AT ONCE | À LA FOIS surveys artist Jinny Yu's last decade of production, from her exhibition at the Venice Biennale *Don't They Ever Stop Migrating?* to *Inextricably Ours*, her recent kaleidoscopically abstract paintings. Using methods as diverse as abstract painting and large-scale installation, Yu's art ponders the implications of mass migration and rapid social change in contemporary society. In *Perpetual Guest*, Yu interrogates her status as a settler-immigrant; in *Hôte*, she navigates the relationship between guest and host through a series of black-and-white abstract drawings that resemble thresholds; in *Inextricably Ours*, Yu breaks from her previous work, using vivid colours, transparency, and distorted forms to continue to question what it means to be a guest and a host.

JINNY YU's work explores the role of painting as a means of trying to understand the world around us. Born in Seoul, Yu now lives and works in Ottawa on the traditional unceded territory of the Anishinabe Algonquin Nation, and in Berlin. Yu's work has been shown widely in exhibitions in Canada, Germany, Italy, Japan, Portugal, South Korea, the UK, and the US. Her exhibition *Don't They Ever Stop Migrating?* was presented at the 56th Venice Biennale.

Precarious Joys accompanies the 2024 edition of the Toronto Biennial of Art — a city-wide exhibition that this year focuses on artists' responses to the impact of colonialism on everyday life. Featuring over 120 full-colour images of artwork — including works by Ahmed Umar, Charles Campbell, Dineo Seshee Bopape, Maria Hupfield, Sonia Boyce, Tessa Mars, and Winsom Winsom — as well as a series of conversations between artists, curators, activists, educators, and cultural organizers, *Precarious Joys* highlights the connections and common practices that appear across the art featured in the Biennial.

The works and conversations included in this celebration of the 2024 Toronto Biennial of Art address the wide-ranging effects of colonialism, tackling issues as diverse as environmental degradation, self-representation and belonging, queer futurity, and migrant diasporas. The result is a volume that emphasizes the importance of entering a collective dialogue at the intersection of art practices, social knowledge, and public action and serves as a meeting place of multiple vocabularies, geographies, and political communities.

Terror and Beauty

- Teitelbaum worked as a screenwriter, designed sets for CBC, served as an art critic for the *Toronto Telegram*, and wrote poetry and fiction.
- Born in Saskatoon, Teitelbaum lived and worked in San Francisco, Montréal, and Winnipeg before settling in Toronto.
- Essayists include Duke Redbird, Sarah Milroy, Sky Goodden, and Matthew Teitelbaum.

Masha Teitelbaum’s work often appears to be born out of creative tension — between substance and void, between will and world, between natural beauty and existential terror. The son of Jewish immigrants, Teitelbaum grew up during a period that saw the Great Depression, the Second World War, and the Holocaust before honing his voice under the likes of Clyfford Still, Ad Reinhardt, and Max Beckmann.

A painter, poet, screenwriter, and novelist, Teitelbaum created works of art that were always arresting, even as they ranged from landscapes to portraits, from figurative to abstract, from modernism to expressionism. Like his life, his art was characterized by an honesty of self-expression, a creative integrity, and a desire to speak truth to power, often placing him in conflict with the establishment.

Masha Teitelbaum: Terror and Beauty is a magnificent volume, featuring more than 250 images, including more than 200 reproductions of artwork from the full scope of Teitelbaum’s career, as well as essays and reflections on his life and work from artists, curators, and friends. It’s a fitting tribute to the work of one of Canada’s most talented and influential artistic outsiders.

ANDREW KEAR is head of programs at Museum London. He was formerly chief curator and curator of Canadian Art at the Winnipeg Art Gallery. Kear has written about and curated exhibitions on a wide range of contemporary and historical Canadian artists, including Karel Funk, L.L. FitzGerald, and William Kurelek.

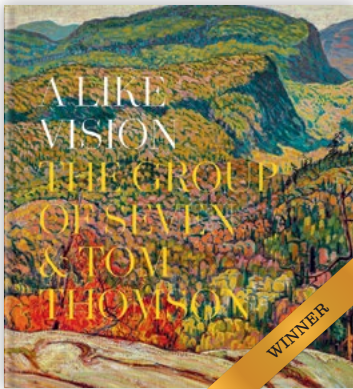

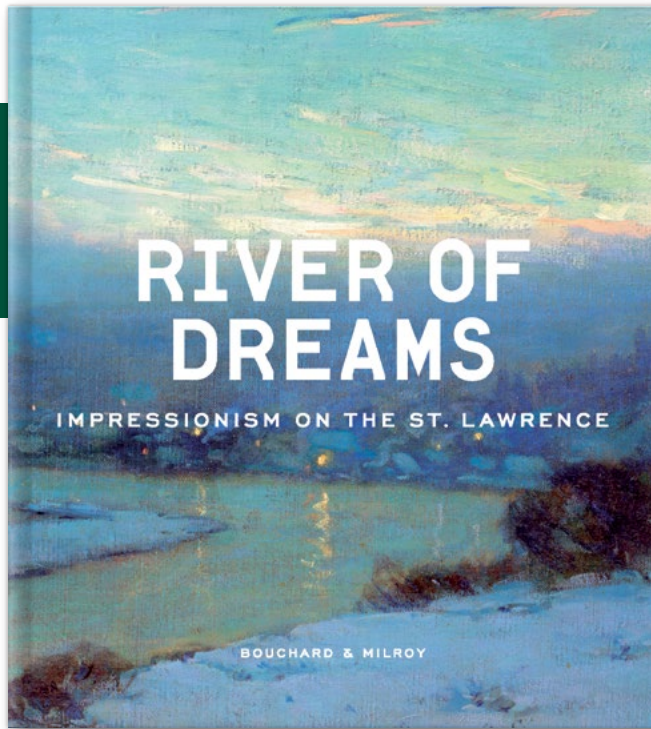
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River of Dreams

Impressionism on the St. Lawrence

Edited by ANNE-MARIE BOUCHARD and SARAH MILROY

River of Dreams celebrates the unique ways that Impressionism was practised by artists in Quebec, offering a close look at the work of such luminaries as Clarence Gagnon, Henrietta Mabel May, James Wilson Morrice, and Marc-Aurèle de Foy Suzor-Coté. These artists documented the shoreline of the St. Lawrence and its surrounding regions, from Montréal downriver to Mont-Saint-Hilaire, Arthabaska, Québec, Beaupré, and Charlevoix.

The Quebec Impressionists were painting at a time of considerable industrial and social change in Quebec, and their choices about what to paint proved pivotal in cementing an image of the province as a site of both industry and leisure — whether in scenes of the industrial port of Montréal, or others capturing the traditional rural way of life in small villages.

Featuring a lead essay by curator Anne-Marie Bouchard; reflections on individual painters by leading artists, curators, and scholars; and more than 175 full-colour images (including reproductions of more than 100 paintings; examples of textiles, pottery, and Indigenous trade goods of the period; and archival photographs), *River of Dreams* is a magnificent tribute to a movement that shaped Canadian art.

SARAH MILROY is Executive Director and Chief Curator at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection. ANNE-MARIE BOUCHARD is a curator specializing in Quebec art based in Québec.

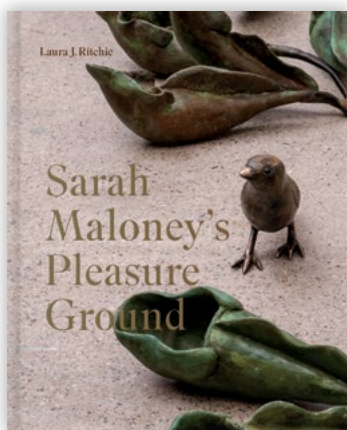

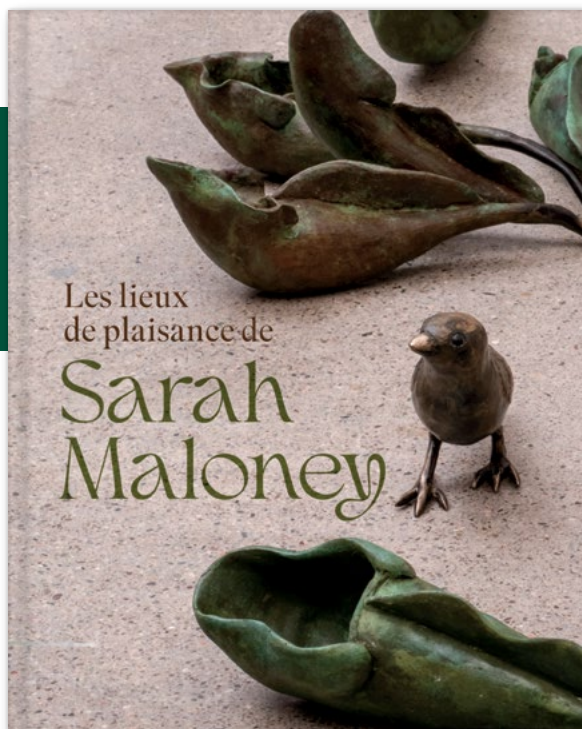

New Brunswick's Fundy Coast has always been a place of movement. The massive tides are so integral to the region's identity that their ebb and flow defines the character of the place.

St. George has seen more than its fair share of the ebb and flow of people and prospects — the typical story of incoming trade and riches, followed by dwindling opportunities. But interest has recently returned to St. George, drawn there by an appreciation for non-urban locales of stark natural beauty, affordability, and down-to-earth people.

Photographer Susan Lapidés has been visiting St. George for over twenty-five years. Her deep commitment to capturing the character of place is brilliantly matched by her innate sense of composition and colour. Her work testifies to the fact that the everyday can be mesmerizing if we are lucky enough to have the right interpreter behind the lens. In Lapidés's photographs, the dusk cobalt blues of the ocean and sky become symphonic and a windswept cliff with a lighthouse, dog, lacrosse player, and tree appear as powerful and enigmatic as an Edward Hopper painting.

SUSAN LAPIDES is a photographer who creates time-based projects focusing on adolescence and place through which she examines social, cultural, and community issues. Lapidés had an extensive career as an editorial photographer for publications including *Smithsonian*, *Life*, *Time*, and *People*. Her award-winning photography is in numerous collections. She resides in Boston, Massachusetts, and in St. George, New Brunswick.

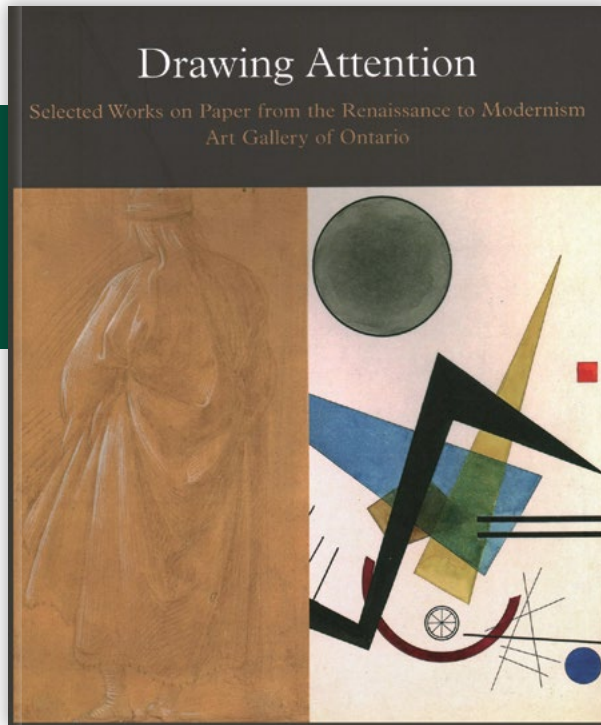

At more than 250 pages, *Drawing Attention* demonstrates the AGO's commitment to acquisition and preservation at the highest level while celebrating the individual pieces that form the nucleus of this dazzling collection.

KATHARINE LOCHNAN is a senior curator emeritus at the Art Gallery of Ontario and a senior fellow at Massey College. Lochnan was the founding curator of the Prints and Drawings Department at the AGO and worked as the department's curator for over 30 years.

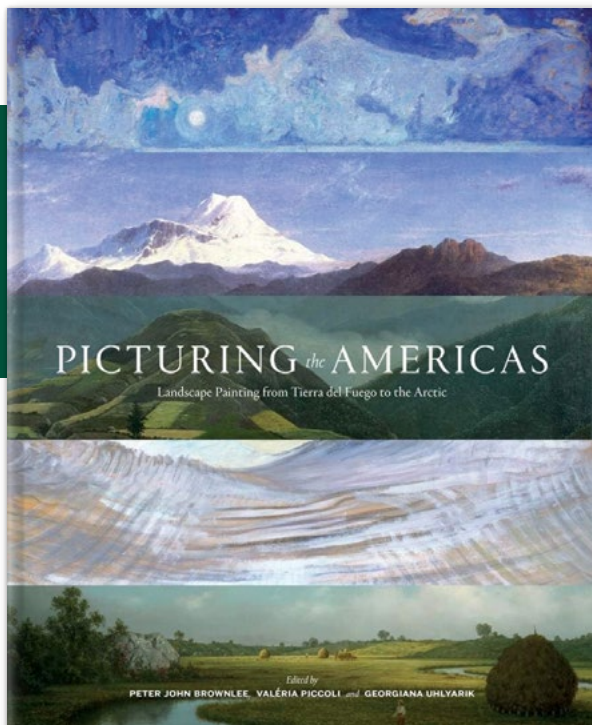

As nations in the Americas gained independence in the early 19th century, a pictorial landscape tradition emerged. By 1840, landscape painting had become the primary medium for articulating conceptions of land and nation in the development of North and South American cultural identities. *Picturing the Americas* offers the first comprehensive treatment of this genre on both American continents, bringing into dialogue the landscape traditions of artists practicing between 1840 and 1940.

Featuring works by artists such as George Beaver, Fred Kabotie, Albert Bierstadt, Georgia O'Keeffe, Frances Anne Hopkins, Lawren Harris, José María Velasco, and Tarsila do Amaral and essays by scholars such as Jolene Rickard, Ihor Holubizky, and Natalia Majluf, this exquisite volume offers perspective on the emergence of modernism, landscape art's role in colonization, and how the development of landscape imagery reflects the geographies and sociopolitical histories of peoples, nations, regions, and diasporas.

VALÉRIA PICCOLI is curator of Latin American Art at the Minneapolis Institute of Art. GEORGIANA UHLYARIK is Fredrik S. Eaton Curator, Canadian Art, and co-lead of the Indigenous + Canadian Art Department at the Art Gallery of Ontario.

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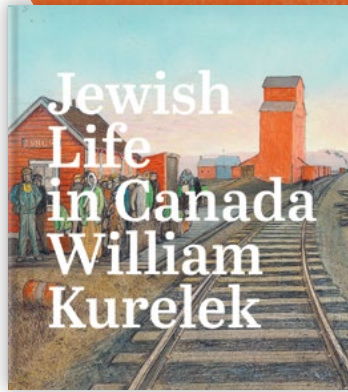
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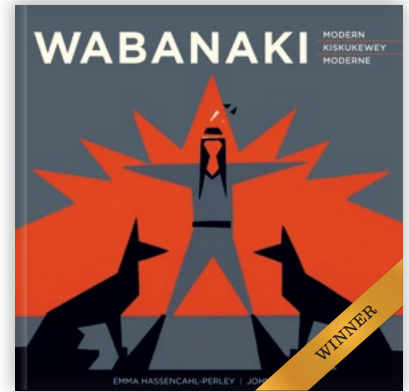
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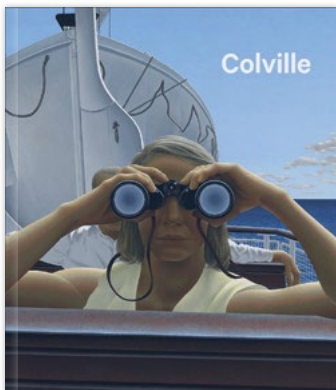


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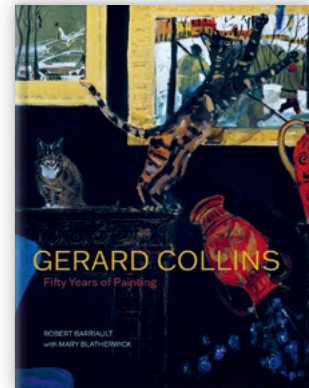
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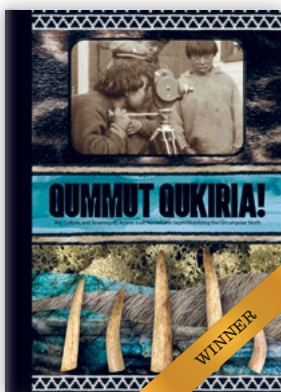
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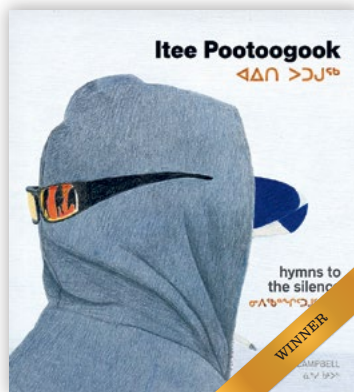
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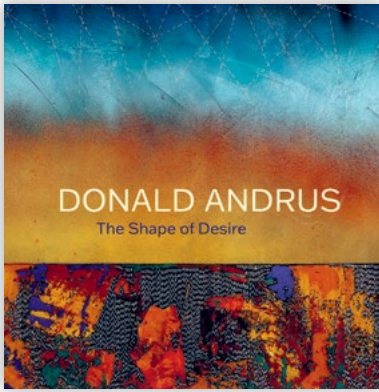
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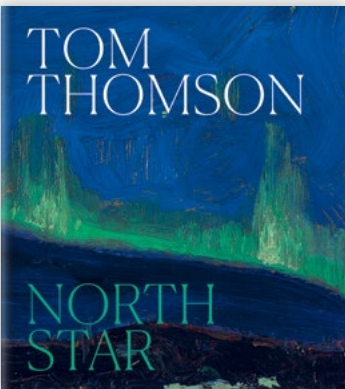
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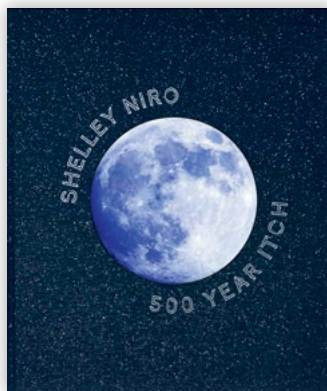
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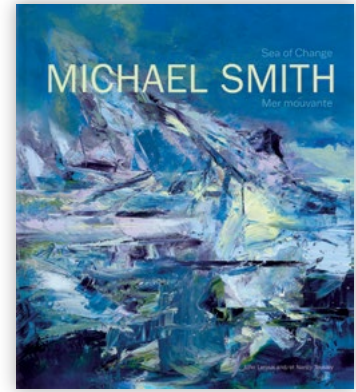
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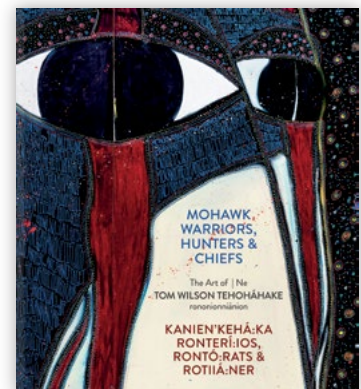
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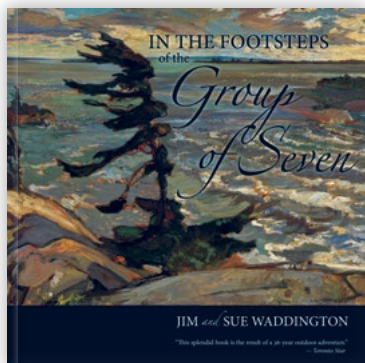
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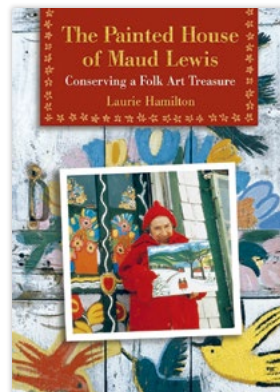
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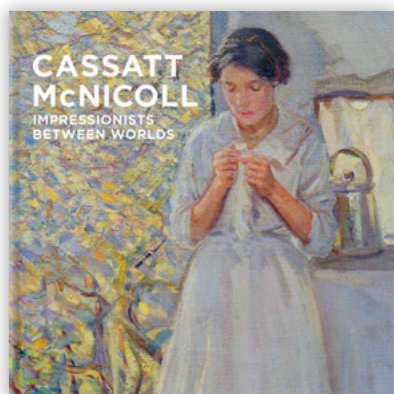
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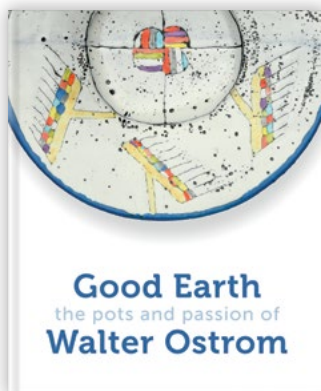
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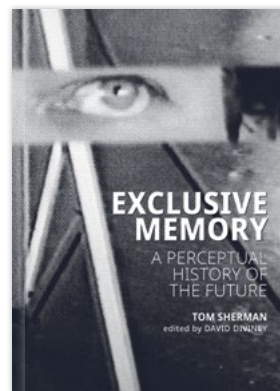
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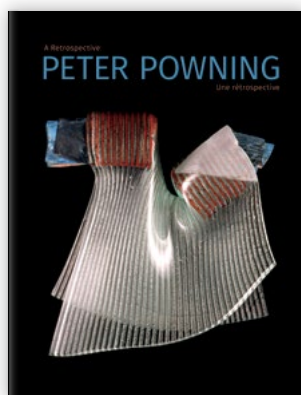
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
