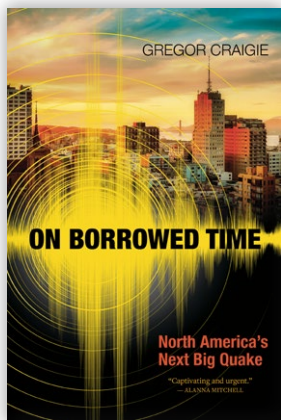

Readers and Reading

They can be identified by their bookstore tote bags, their “Book Lover” mugs, by the bound, printed stacks of paper they flip through, or by the eBook reader that they scroll through on their lap. They are, for lack of a more specific term, readers. Becoming a reader seems simple enough: get a book (in whatever format that pleases you), read it, and voila! You’re a reader—no tote bag necessary.

In 2020, which for some of us seems almost a lifetime ago, the species of readers enlarged its population for the first time in decades. Publishers, booksellers, and libraries, lacking the usual drop-in traffic, reached out to them directly—through emails, social media, and other forms of digital communication—and suddenly, a whole new era was born. Communities emerged. Websites, blogs, social media, and online events became ubiquitous tools of communication. Readers flocked to bookstore and library websites, looking for ways to survive their newfound solitude through reading. Book purchases increased, library membership grew, and the population of readers burgeoned with the discovery—or perhaps the rediscovery—of the pleasures of reading.

Many pundits have suggested that this phenomenon would be temporary and as life returned to normal, reading would diminish. But thus far, they appear to be mistaken. In 2022, library borrowings were still at historic highs and library systems are still struggling to keep up with the demand. That’s good news.

More than that, there’s a new energy in book retail. Hundreds of new bookstores have sprouted up since March 2020, with many indicating that their communities are beginning to understand how important it is to rally around their local bookstores. And chain booksellers in the UK, the US, and Canada appear to be listening, taking a page out of their independent colleagues’ handbook. This, too, is good news, especially if we are to sustain this renaissance in reading.

Canadian publishers such as Goose Lane Editions are participating in this phenomenon by joining and engaging with communities of readers. More than that, Canadian publishers have spent a significant portion of the pandemic listening to communities of readers, writers, and editors; engaging deeply with authors; and broadening their published offerings. Goose Lane’s Winter-Spring catalogue offers a rich collection of work that offers authentic perspectives on the world in which we live. We hope that you’ll dive in, immerse yourselves, and find reasons to spend time with our books and the many others on your reading list.

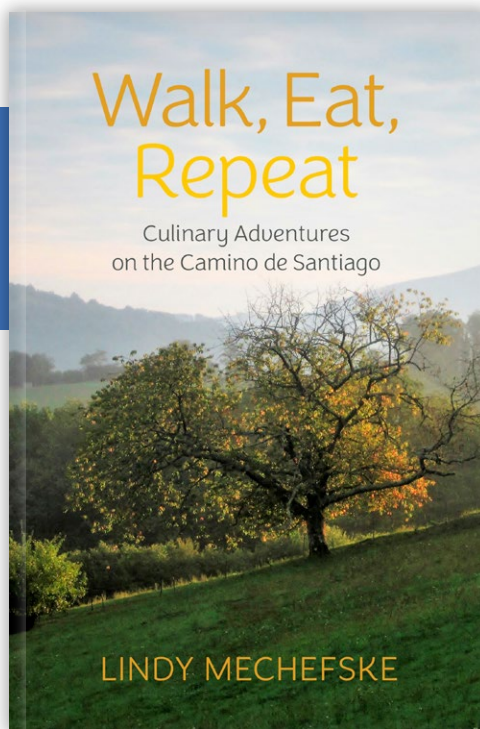

In this deeply personal culinary travelogue, food culture writer Lindy Mechefske invites readers to join her in savouring the richness of the Camino. Returning to the most basic human needs—walking, eating, and sleeping—she rediscovers purpose at a time of change and transition.

Walk, Eat, Repeat recounts Mechefske’s arduous, yet fulfilling, pilgrimage on the Camino from the Pyrenees mountains to the ancient pilgrim city of Santiago de Compostela. Inspired by her late father’s words, “soldier on,” she chronicles the highs and lows of the trail, the kindness of her fellow pilgrims, and the tortas, tartas, tortillas, and other culinary delights that she savoured along the way. With each chapter accompanied by a recipe from the region, Mechefske has not simply written a story of walking the Camino, but a tale of relishing the emotional intimacies and the epicurean treasures of this ancient pilgrim path.

LINDY MECHEFSKE is the author of four previous books on food and culture, two of which have won Taste Canada Gold Awards. A lifelong walker, Mechefske has hiked and climbed in the Alps, Appalachians, and England’s Lake District and Peak District. She lives in Kingston, Ontario.

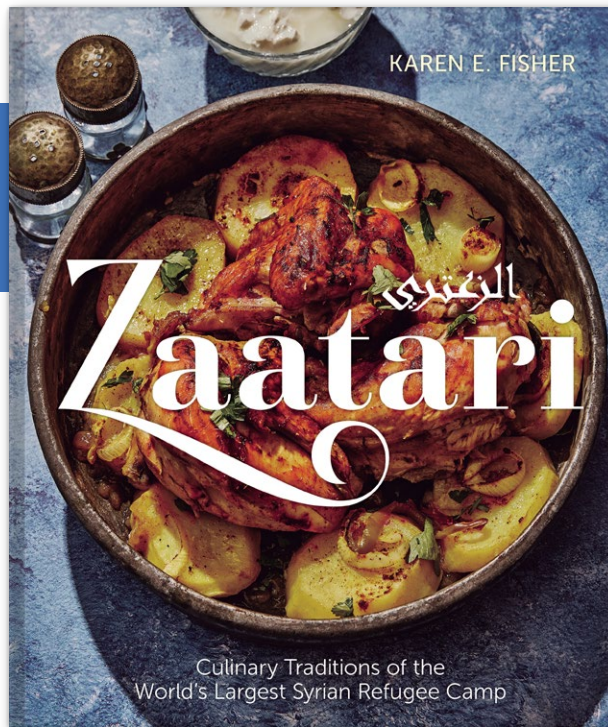

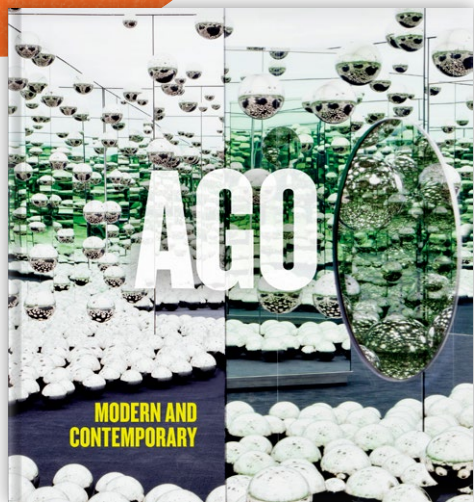

In this immersive culinary tour, Karen E. Fisher guides us through life at Zaatari, sharing its stories, its art, and its food. Authentically styled and stunningly photographed dishes accompany a vast array of recipes prepared by the camp's residents for family dinners and community celebrations—and now for others to enjoy at home.

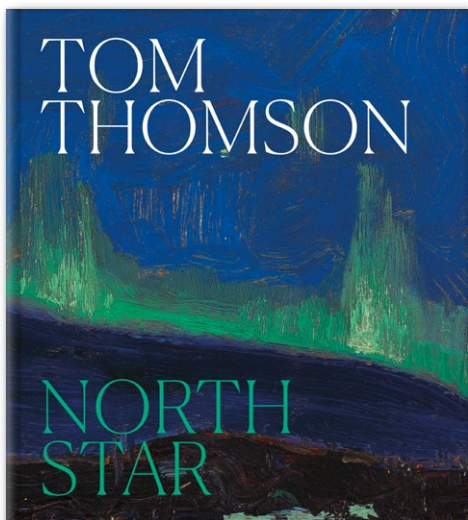

Tom Wilson Tehoháhake is a modern Mohawk artist, Juno Award winner, best-selling author, and newly appointed member of the Order of Canada. In his 2017 memoir, *Beautiful Scars*, Wilson revealed the astonishing story of how he discovered he is Mohawk. In *Mohawk Warriors, Hunters & Chiefs*, Wilson further explores his identity through a stunning collection of paintings that explore what it means to be removed from and reconnected with your cultural heritage.

Featuring over 35 full-colour images of Wilson’s work, from guitars decorated with iconography drawn from beadwork to multimedia reflections on his upbringing in Hamilton, *Mohawk Warriors, Hunters & Chiefs* explores how Wilson began painting when all he knew of his identity were hints and dreams, and how his art has developed and grown over the past few years. An interview on his artistic process with Ryan McMahon and essays by Wilson and curator David Liss round out Wilson’s stunning visual exploration of his Mohawk identity.

DAVID LISS is an independent curator, writer, and artist living in Toronto, who was formerly director and curator of the Museum of Contemporary Art Toronto. TOM WILSON TEHOHÁHAKE is a Mohawk performer, writer, storyteller, and visual artist from Hamilton, Ontario. A multiple Juno Award winner, his memoir *Beautiful Scars* was a national bestseller and a CBC Best Book of 2017.

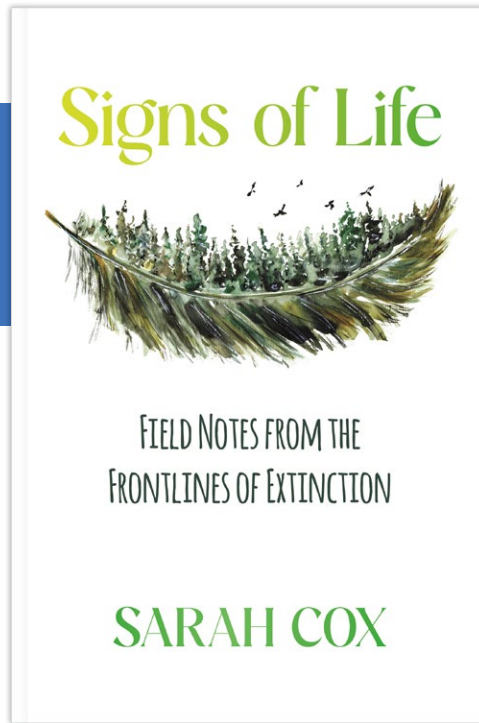

Signs of Life

Field Notes from the Frontlines of Extinction

SARAH COX


- Cox shows how governments are exacerbating the extinction vortex.
- *Signs of Life* reports on controversial conservation attempts such as cloning and genetic modification.
- Ranchers in the prairies have found creative ways to rejuvenate grasslands, one of Canada’s most endangered ecosystems.


Environmental journalist Sarah Cox has witnessed what happens when we drive species to the brink of extinction. In *Signs of Life*, she accompanies the Canadian military, Indigenous guardians, biologists, conservationists, and ordinary people who are racing to save hundreds of species before it’s too late.

Travelling across the country, Cox visits the Toronto Zoo, home of Canada’s only wildlife biobank, where scientists conserve living cells from endangered species in the event of future loss; tours Canada’s military bases, home to some of Canada’s last preserved ecosystems; and travels to Indigenous communities where land stewards are striving to restore the delicate ecological balance that has sustained people for millennia.

Through the eyes and work of individuals who are bringing species back from the precipice, Cox delivers both an urgent message and a fresh perspective on how we can protect biodiversity and begin to turn things around.

SARAH COX is an award-winning journalist, whose work has been published extensively in *The Narwhal*, where she writes about energy and environmental issues. Her book *Breaching the Peace: the Site C Dam and a Valley’s Stand against Big Hydro* won a B.C. Book Prize and was a finalist for the Writer’s Trust Shaughnessy Cohen Prize for Political Writing. She lives in Victoria, BC.

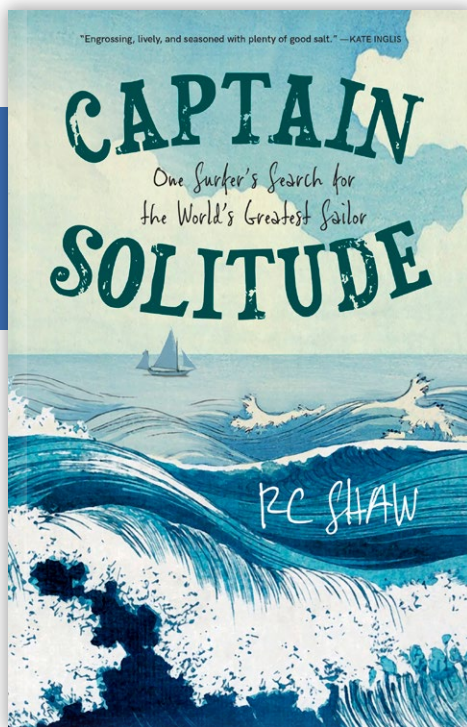

Captain Solitude

One Surfer’s Search for the World’s Greatest Sailor

In April of 1895, a Nova Scotian by the name of Joshua Slocum set sail from Boston with the goal of circumnavigating the globe by himself. Three years and 46,000 miles later, he would publish the story of his journey, *Sailing Alone Around the World*, an instant classic that has since never been out of print. A decade later, in 1909, Slocum set sail for the Amazon and was never seen again.

More than a century later another Nova Scotian adventurer, RC Shaw, leaves his home in Cow Bay on a bicycle bound for Slocum’s childhood home of Brier Island. Travelling down Nova Scotia’s South Shore, Shaw sets off on a journey to chase the ghost of Joshua Slocum, casting aside reason and attempting his own miraculous sea crossing.

Rollicking, refreshing, and undeniably adventurous, *Captain Solitude* is one man’s story of whimsical spirit-rousing, saltwater transcendence, and the discovery of the hidden layers and characters of Nova Scotia’s coastal crown.

RC SHAW is a writer and outdoor enthusiast from Cow Bay, Nova Scotia. He holds an MFA in Creative Nonfiction from the University of King’s College. His first book *Louisbourg or Bust* was a finalist for the Margaret and John Savage First Book Award.

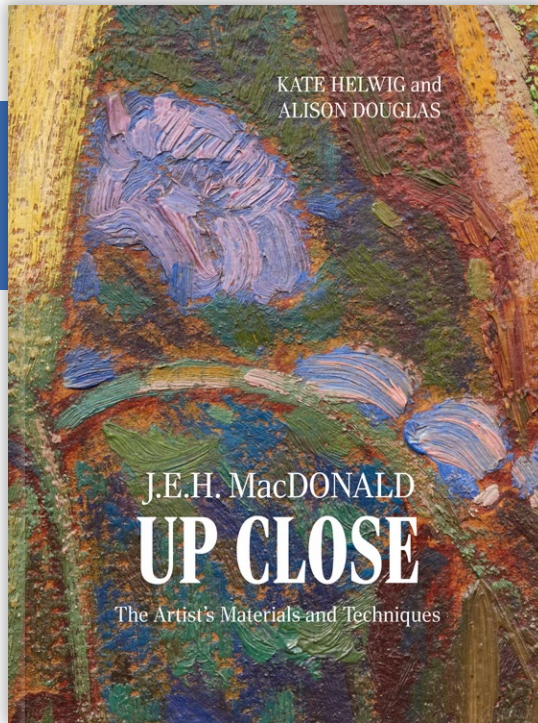

J.E.H. MacDonald *Up Close* The Artist's Materials and Techniques KATE HELWIG and ALISON DOUGLAS

- An investigation of the artist's materials and technique, revealed by physical and microscopic examinations.
- A fascinating forensic window into questions of authenticity of MacDonald paintings.
- Accompanies an exhibition at the Vancouver Art Gallery running from December 2023 to May 2024.

At the height of his career, J.E.H. MacDonald's paintings and oil sketches reveal a mastery of colour mixing, a sureness of brushstroke, and a deep understanding of compositional design. His striking landscapes and views of nature are an important artistic legacy and confirm his essential place among the Group of Seven painters.

J.E.H. MacDonald Up Close provides a fresh interpretation of MacDonald's artistic development and sheds new light on questions of authenticity and dating surrounding MacDonald's paintings. Here art conservation experts Kate Helwig and Alison Douglas combine rigorous scientific analysis with a close visual examination of MacDonald's work to focus on his materials and techniques. Exploring the interface between art history and science, Helwig and Douglas use excerpts from MacDonald's diaries, letters, and lectures to provide socio-historical context to their in-depth reading of the paintings as physical objects.

Helwig and Douglas's fascinating text is accompanied not only by reproductions of key artworks, but also by never-before-seen photographs taken through a microscope. These unique, close-up views of MacDonald's working methods reveal the texture of his brushstrokes and the characteristic ways he layered and mixed his paint.

KATE HELWIG, M.Sc., M.A.C. is a senior conservation scientist at the Canadian Conservation Institute in Ottawa, Ontario. ALISON DOUGLAS, B.F.A., M.A.C., is the conservator at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection in Kleinburg, Ontario.

Sea of Change

JOHN LEROUX and NANCY TOUSLEY

- Accompanies a major exhibition at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery opening in May 2024.
- Smith is represented by the Nicholas Metivier Gallery (Toronto), the Trepanier Baer Gallery (Calgary) and the Galerie Michel Guimont (Montréal).
- Includes a series of paintings inspired by George Chambers's 1838 painting *The Crew of H.M.S. 'Terror' Saving the Boats and Provisions on the Night of 15th March 1837* during Smith's time as artist-in-residence at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery.

Montreal-based painter Michael Smith is known for his fluid and impasto surfaces as well as his ability to strike a poetic balance between representation and abstraction. Inspired by art history as well as historic and current events, Smith pulls from various sources to create his energetic landscapes and seascapes. His recent *Sea of Change* painting series was inspired by a serendipitous encounter with a 19th-century painting of the Arctic expedition ship H.M.S. *Terror* during his time as artist-in-residence at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery in 2018.

This record of the major exhibition of Michael Smith's paintings at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery, along with an insightful look into his past work, demonstrates his ability to mix landscape and historical scenes with abstraction, creating fictional spaces that show how experience impacts the way we view the world. Layering texture and colour, the familiar with the unfamiliar, Smith's paintings convey (as Smith writes), "a mix of excitement and anxiety of a land, [that] although at times bucolic, is riddled with shadows."

Michael Smith: Sea of Change features 50 large-scale reproductions, an essay on Smith's trajectory as an artist by critic-curator Nancy Tousley, and an interview with the artist by curator John Leroux.

MICHAEL SMITH's work is included in numerous public collections, including those of le Musée d'art contemporain de Montréal, le Musée des beaux-arts de Montréal, the Beaverbrook Art Gallery, Rideau Hall, and la Citadelle de Québec.

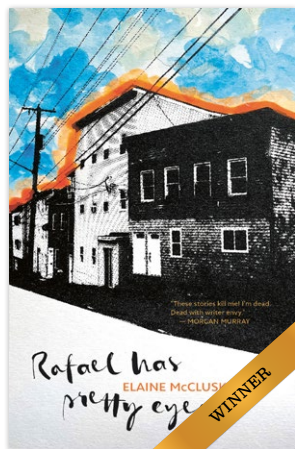

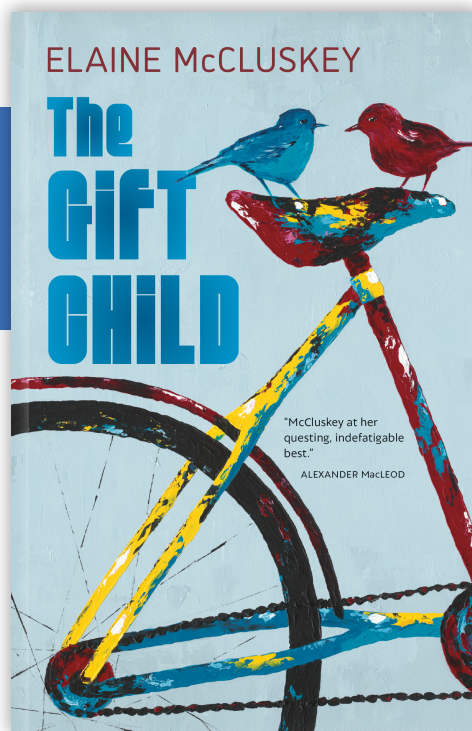

Graham Swim is good at playing the harmonica and making friends, but one day he disappears in Pollock Passage, Nova Scotia. The last sighting of Graham is him riding away from a government wharf with a giant tuna head in the basket of his Schwinn delivery bicycle.

When Graham’s cousin Harriett decides to investigate his disappearance, she comes up against her own family history. A news photographer now jobless and adrift, Harriett has lived most of her life in the shadow of her larger-than-life father — a once-beloved TV news anchor and borderline narcissist.

Arriving in Pollock Passage, Harriet meets a stranger who tells her he is researching the Shag Harbour UFO mystery. While this stranger helps Harriett reconnect with pieces of herself she thought long-dead, she also learns that what she knows about her father may not be true.

Vintage McCluskey, *The Gift Child* showcases McCluskey’s unique ability to capture the malleability of memory and the complex absurdity and nobility of humanity. It’s a novel that’s hard to put down; it’s even harder to forget.

ELAINE McCLUSKEY is a critically acclaimed fiction writer based in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. Her 2022 collection *Rafael Has Pretty Eyes* won the Alistair MacLeod Prize for Short Fiction. McCluskey’s stories have appeared in the *The Antigone Review*, *Room*, and *subTerrain* and been shortlisted for the Journey Prize. *The Gift Child* is her seventh book of fiction.

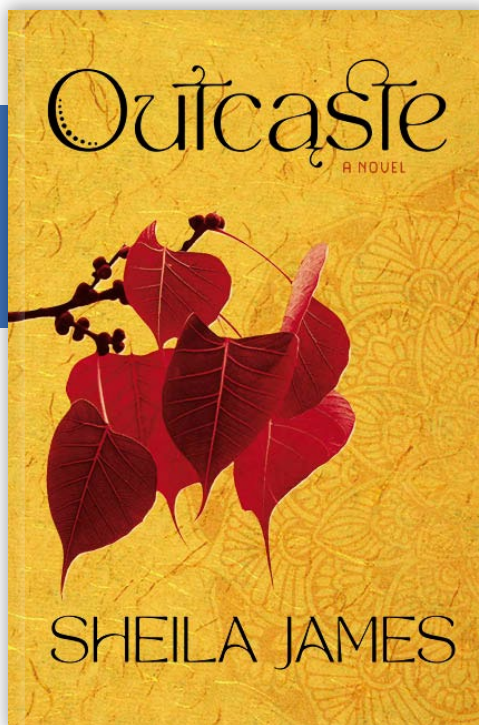

Outcaste

SHEILA JAMES

- An epic tale that spans fifty years, four generations, and two continents.
- The Telangana People's Struggle was a communist-led rebellion lasting from 1946 to 1951. It briefly controlled much of Hyderabad State and challenged caste and gender oppression.
- Sheila James is a multi-disciplinary artist and works in equity, diversity, and inclusion.
- A commentary on contemporary India, diaspora, and Queer identity.

Perched out of sight in a tree beside the road, Malika, a communist resistance fighter, prepares to assassinate the new governor in a village in the recently independent India. As she prepares to shoot, she recognizes the man riding in the car and hesitates.

The man is Rayappa, who Malika had first met five years earlier in the village of Korampally. Both were deemed “untouchables.” Yet, Malika toiled as a servant in a landowner’s household while Rayappa worked for a visiting anthropologist.

Fifty years later, Rayappa, now living in Canada as Irwin Peter, receives a letter asking for information about Malika. When he decides to return to India with his family, he is forced to revisit Korampally’s turbulent history—and his own. The lingering legacy of the caste system, the brutal invasion of the kingdom of Hyderabad by the nascent Indian state, and the encounter between Irwin and Malika would all have profound consequences.

A brilliant, complex novel, *Outcaste* radiates with an unquenchable life-force. Shimmering with emotional depth and crackling with vibrancy, *Outcaste* revisits a complex period in India’s history while imbuing ordinary lives with extraordinarily dramatic dimensions.

SHEILA JAMES is the author of *In the Wake of Loss*, a finalist for the Ottawa Book Awards. Her videos have been screened internationally, including *Unmapping Desire*, which co-won the Akua Award for Best Lesbian Short Film at Toronto’s Inside Out International Film Festival.

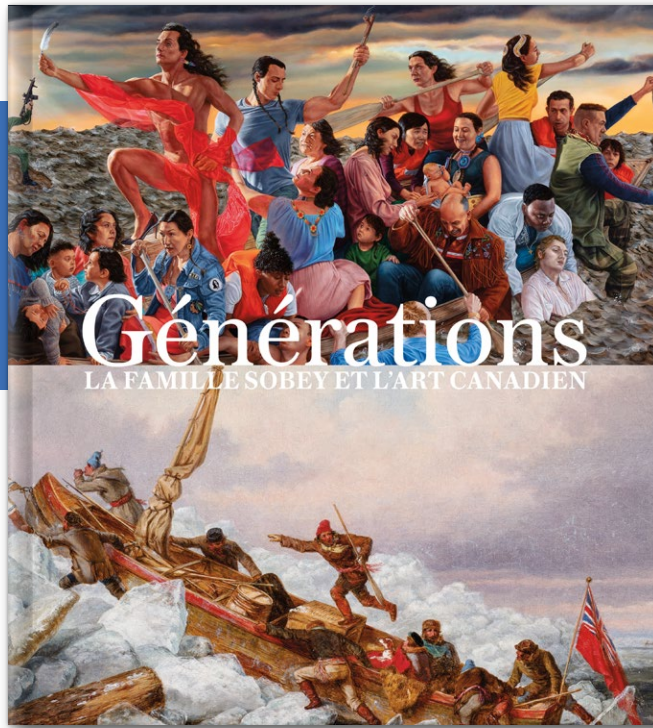

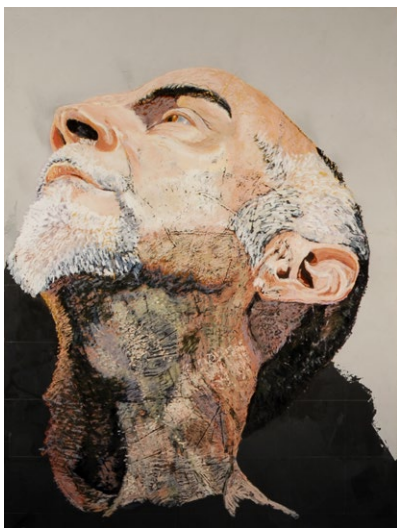

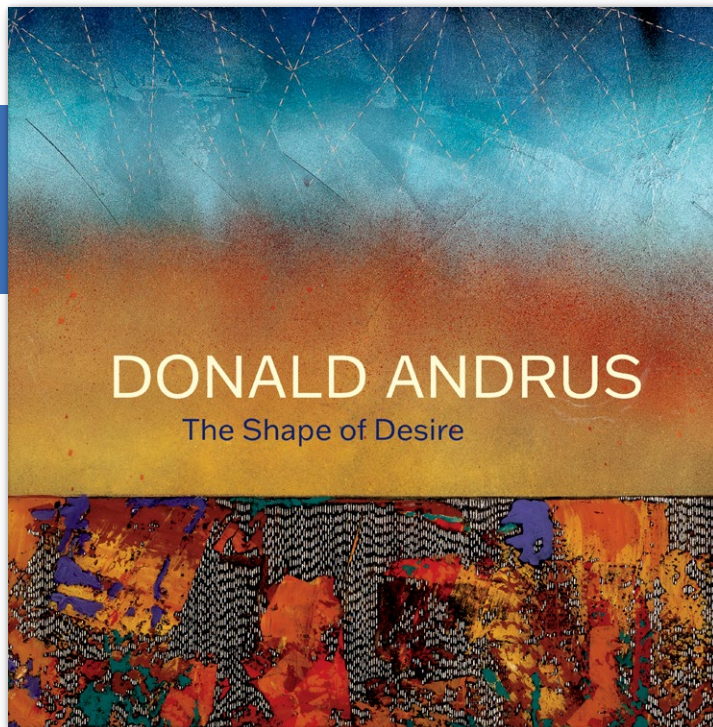

Donald Andrus

The Shape of Desire

The art of Donald Andrus defies categorization. Although principally known for his abstract paintings, Andrus has, throughout his career, combined his first love — drawing — with a deep engagement with colour, a desire for experimentation, a keen interest in the physical qualities of his materials, and the sensory experience of the viewer.

Donald Andrus: The Shape of Desire brings together four major essays, including one by the artist, and more than eighty full-colour reproductions to assess a body of work that extends from abstract paintings to portraits. Roslyn Rosenfeld writes about Andrus's early abstract work, Ihor Holubizky considers his portraits, and Pan Wendt revisits the artist's contemporary abstract paintings. Taken together, the essays and images take full measure of the entirety of Andrus's career and influences — from the landscapes of Greece and the poetry of George Seferis to the cinematic works of Andrei Tarkovsky and the pioneering work of contemporary German artists Gerhard Richter and Anselm Kiefer.

DONALD ANDRUS has been painting for over thirty-five years. His work has been exhibited at galleries and museums throughout Canada and may be found in both private and public collections. He has previously worked as a curator at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery, as a lecturer at the University of New Brunswick, and as a professor of art history at Concordia University. Andrus now lives and works in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

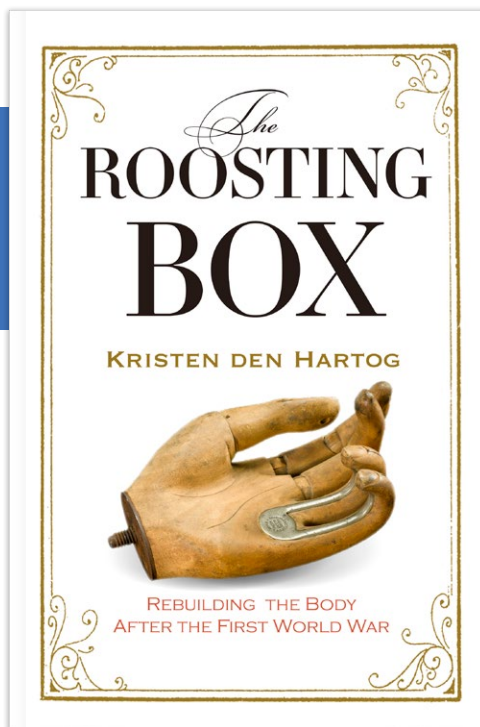

At the end of the First World War, a cash register factory in Toronto was renovated to treat wounded soldiers returning home. From 1919 to the 1940s, thousands of veterans passed through its doors. Some spent the remainder of their lives there.

An exquisitely written history of the early years of the Christie Street Hospital and how war reshaped Canadian society, *The Roosting Box* places ordinary people at the heart of the story: veterans learning to live with their injuries and a world irrevocably changed; nurses caring for patients while carrying their own wartime trauma; and doctors pioneering research in prosthetics, plastic surgery, or a treatment for diabetes.

Naming chapters after parts of the body, den Hartog chronicles injuries and treatments, and the struggles and accomplishments of patients and staff. The cast of characters is diverse — Black, female, Indigenous, and people with all sorts of physical and mental challenges — and their experiences, gleaned from diaries, letters, service records, genealogical research, and interviews with descendants, are surprising and illuminating.

An unusual mix of history and story, *The Roosting Box* offers deeply personal perspectives on healing in the aftermath of war.

KRISTEN den HARTOG is a decorated novelist and non-fiction writer. Her books have won an Alberta Book Publishing Award and been nominated for both a Trillium Award and the City of Toronto Book Award.

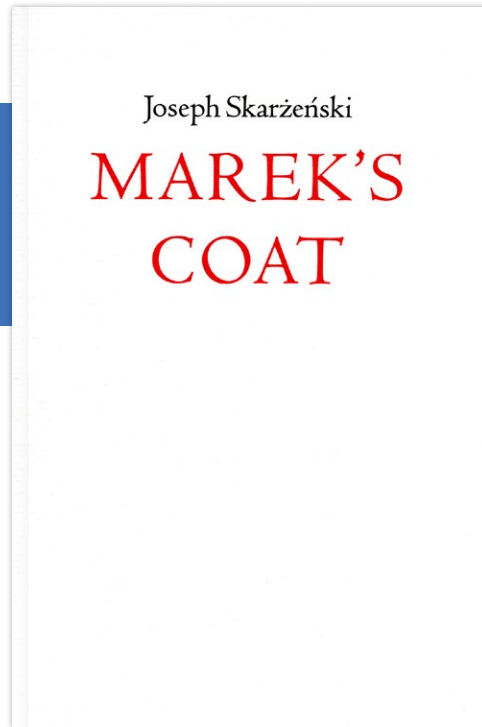

Marek's Coat

JOSEPH SKARŻEŃSKI

- A memoir of the extraordinary childhood of a Polish boy deported to Siberia by the Soviets.
- Following time spent in Uzbekistan, Iran, and India, Skarżeński eventually settled in Canada.
- Around one million Poles were deported to Siberia during the Second World War.

Early in the morning of April 13, 1940, seven-year-old Marek was awakened by a loud pounding on his front door. A local Soviet collaborator informed Marek's mother that their family must leave their home and head to the train station. Marek, his mother, and two sisters had little time to pack, but even though it was already spring, Marek's mother made sure he wore his winter coat.

Marek and his family became one of roughly one million Poles who were deported from their homes by the Soviets and sent to work in Siberia. In *Marek's Coat*, Joseph Skarżeński tells the wondrous story of his youth: his years spent herding cattle in Siberia with a Kyrgyz shepherd, who taught him how to survive the ferocious winters; his journey through Central Asia to an Indian orphanage for Polish refugees established by the Maharajah of Nawanagar; and how his simple winter coat saved his family over and over again.

A memoir of separation, isolation, and rebirth into a post-war world, *Marek's Coat* is a reminder of what it takes to survive when the world goes mad.

JOSEPH SKARŻEŃSKI was born in Poland and deported with his mother and sisters to Siberia during the Second World War. Following the end of the war, he lived in England and Canada. He now lives in Ottawa.

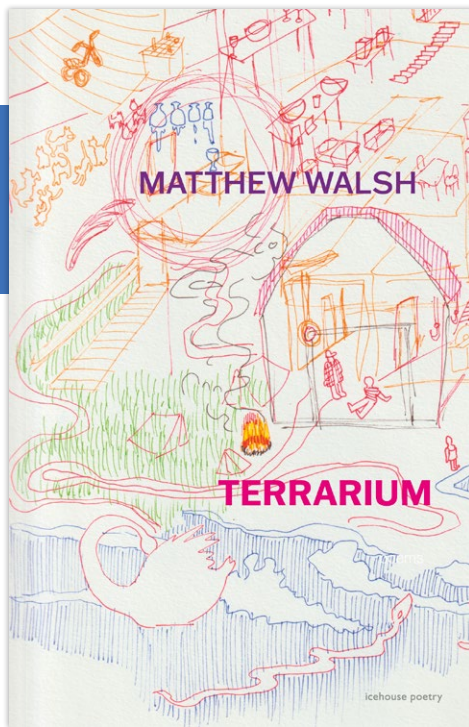

MATTHEW WALSH

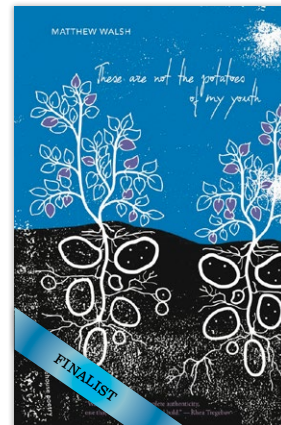
Raw, confessional, and often messy, *Terrarium* continues Matthew Walsh's exploration of Queer identity and desire against the lonely highs and lows of depression and addiction.

In this new collection, Walsh begins where their debut collection, *These are not the potatoes of my youth*, left off. Writing in their trademark conversational style, Walsh wanders from Toronto parkettes “with remnants of magnolia leaves” to California, “a long/black cocktail dress the night lights/ amethyst and citrine against the arm/muscle of the sea,” their voice intimate and exposed, a whisper between friends or lovers.

And then, when Walsh ruminates on influences and themes as diverse as the poetry of Frank O'Hara and Gwendolyn MacEwen, the vagaries of Instagram, and the reimagination of Miss Havisham in a Toronto bathhouse, they offer readers the opportunity to think deeply or laugh loudly, reaching out to close the gap between us.

MATTHEW WALSH grew up in Nova Scotia and now lives in Toronto. Their poems have appeared in *Joyland*, the *Capra Review*, the *Antigonish Review*, the *Malahat Review*, and *Geist*; in a chapbook entitled *ICQ*; and in their celebrated book-length collection *These are not the potatoes of my youth*, a finalist for the Trillium and Gerald Lampert Awards.

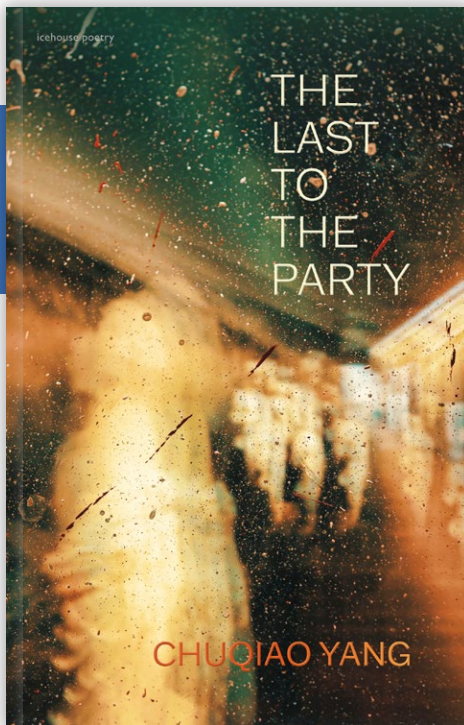

Yang's poems journey restlessly through recollections of a Saskatchewan childhood, trips to visit family in Taiyuan, and a sojourn across the American South in search of the moments and places where one became a stranger to oneself. “You are a mouse in the backcountry of your memories,” writes Yang, “You are a fox in winter, devouring well-meaning friends.” Irreverent, fierce, and ceaselessly surprising, *The Last to the Party* marks the arrival of a unique voice and an unsparing poetic vision.

CHUQIAO YANG's poems have appeared in *The Unpublished City*, *Ricepaper*, *Arc Poetry Magazine*, *Canthius*, *Prism*, *Grain*, *CV2*, and *Room*, and on CBC Radio. She was a finalist for the Bronwen Wallace Award for Emerging Writers and her chapbook, *Reunions in the Year of the Sheep*, won the bpNichol Chapbook Award. *The Last to the Party* is her first full-length collection.
